# CSEG 2016 ANNUAL REPORT

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## President

The CSEG has continued to work hard, work together and plan big as we move toward the 75th Anniversary in 2025. Over the past year the CSEG Strategy survey and Strategy Plan have been accomplished. The Strategy Plan continues to be a focus at the monthly Executive meetings especially around the discussion of budget and financial health. The four main Strategy plan objectives are:

- 1. Financial Health
- 2. Member Value
- 3. Promotion of the Profession
- 4. Position of the CSEG as a professional society

You may have noticed that the Survey results and the Plan are on the CSEG website home page for your convenience. The CSEG Strategy should continue to evolve and be of utmost importance to the Society.

Part of the Strategy survey and Plan was the increase of membership dues on a sliding scale based on income and the honor system. Dues haven't changed over the past 16 years and albeit a tough decision, the need was clear. The CSEG is also capturing demographic information in the membership renewal process to be used as a guide for the CSEG programs and budget for the composition of the membership. The demographics will be anonymously kept and not linked to any particular member. However, the data is critical for planning purposes and budget allocation. If the CSEG doesn't understand its membership composition then how can we adapt for its evolution?

The New Initiatives committee was set up in 2016 and is led by CSEG VP, John Duhault, in alignment with the CSEG Strategy objectives. John has been working with the committee and the Haskayne School of Business on some very creative marketing and revenue generation ideas. Stay tuned to that space from John Duhault.

Board of Directors best practices have been adopted by the CSEG Executives to facilitate better on information exchanges, focus on strategic discussion and Bylaw updates. We've eliminated the AGM requirement for Bylaw change adoptions and now have a process where members can vote online for any future adaptations. The CSEG Board also created the CSEG Governance document which serves as a guide for the Board and the members.

Advocacy, government engagement and education has been a personal focus of mine in 2015 and 2016 for the CSEG and its members. I've personally reached out to the Federal Minister of Natural Resources, Jim Carr, and our Alberta ministers, Federal Ministers and MP's. We even had Mayor Nenshi speak at our AGM in March. The City of Calgary, the Alberta and Federal Ministers along with Minister Jim Carr now know what the CSEG is and the amazing value its volunteers accomplish.

The joint societies of the CSEG, CSPG, CWLS, CSUR and the SPE planned and implemented an Energy Employment Crisis round-table with other leaders from the community here in Calgary which led to further discussions with several Alberta Members of Parliament and beyond. Those advocacy efforts continue to help those

unemployed, underemployed and in transition but the reality is we all have to work to help ourselves. Postings on the CSEG LinkedIn and Twitter accounts have increased for information sharing on these accomplishments and opportunities to have your voice heard on many topics ranging from the Trans-Mountain Expansion project, Climate Change, the NEB modernization, APEGA Legislative Review and other topics such as gender disparity in unemployment rates in the scientific realm. Join the CSEG social media outlets if you haven't already, stay connected and have your voices heard.

More advocacy was displayed by the CSEG Executive representation and it's District Representatives at the SEG Council meeting that occurred during the SEG Annual meeting in Dallas, TX. I'm proud to say that the innovation and strategic planning of the CSEG has been noticed by the SEG. There may be more opportunity to influence in that space as well.

Awareness about Women in STEM in our industry has also been topics of discussion with GeoWomen, AWSN, the University of Calgary, Mount Royal University, our politicians, etc. with actions occurring to continue the focus on diversity in our industry and STEM.

Unemployment has affected a lot of us personally and consequently, the CSEG. Change is uncomfortable and I've felt this as well. It has been a tough time and challenges continue for the industry, the Society and all of us. The CSEG has also had tough financial decisions that needed to be made, cuts that needed to occur and new financial models that needed to be adopted. The CSEG staff has had to take some cuts too along the way. We still have some adaptations that should occur and hopefully those resistant to change will see the need for the future of the CSEG's survival and thriving future. We can always improve on how we problem solve for the benefit of the CSEG.

We still face many challenges ahead as a Society. The CSEG encourages all geoscientists to keep their membership current, stay connected and get involved through volunteering to continue to build a constructive network. # Vice President

## **VIG Committee:**

I chaired the VIG, (Value of Integrated Geophysics), committee and presented several papers at technical society meetings.

The first VIG presentation in 2016 was part of an SPE breakfast series that Lee Hunt, David Gray and myself taught for over 2 hours each on three separate mornings. Twenty to thirty attendees were in each class, small but attentive.

Other presentations were given to APEGA and CWLS in Q4 2016. Another 80-people heard the VIG word.

I presented the Value of Applied Geophysics as a one day short course at the CSEG Doodletrain in November 2016.

I passed over the Chairmanship of the VIG Committee to Paul Hausmanis in Q4 in order to focus on other CSEG executive duties.

## **NIC Committee:**

My other largest time commitment for the CSEG was the creation of the New Initiatives Committee (NIC). It involved gathering several people from throughout our society to help come up with some new ways to get revenue into the CSEG. The committee met several times from June to September. The team created a plan to help set the stage for a Haskayne School of Business MBA Marketing student study to be started in January 2017.

The committee came up with a list of questions that was inserted into a short survey.

The committee also came up with a list of people in Service Companies, and Operating Companies. These people were identified as "Ambassadors" or "Decision Makers" within a specific target company. The Ambassador was to promote the CSEG and the survey to the Decision Maker.

The Decision Maker was asked if they would be willing to be interviewed by the students in Q1 2017.

In the end over 100 people were sent the survey, 45 replied and 32 decision makers agreed to be interviewed.

The Value Proposition was made to the students by myself and Jessica McPherson on January 16th.

The reports from the students will be presented in April 2017 and the recommendations for potential new revenue sources will be implemented in Q4 2017 and budget year 2018.

## Past President

During 2016, as Part President, there are a few key areas for which I have been responsible: APEGA Legislative Review, Canadian Federation of Earth Sciences, CSEG Awards, Past Presidents Luncheon & President's Advisory Council.

## **APEGA**

As the legislative body governing engineering and earth science, APEGA has spent considerable effort working through a legislative review. Consultations were first held in the Spring and Fall of 2015 and continued into 2016. Legislative Champions were put in place to promote the Legislative Review – not to champion the changes but to champion the involvement of members in the process. Besides myself (P.Geoph, P.Geol), a number of CSEG members were involved as Legislative Champions (Ken Mitchell (P.Geoph.), Neda Bouroumand (Geoph.I.T), Rob Vestrum (P.Geo.) and Charles Welsh (P.Geoph.). They continued to provide a valuable service to members, both informing the membership of the process and proposed changes as well as making the voices of geoscientists heard during the review sessions. Every geoscientist spoke clearly and loudly in 2015, and, given that the proposed changes have significant impact on many of our members, continued to do so in 2016.

## **CFES**

The Canadian Federation of Earth Sciences (www.cfes-fcst.ca) was formed as an umbrella organisation for earth science societies across Canada, and the CSEG is a member of this group.

Traditionally, the President of each member society sits on the CFES Council advising on the direction of the organisation. In 2014, to enhance continuity, I took on the role committing to three years as Vice President, President then Past President (2014-2017). In 2015, the CFES Council and Board discussed the need for additional industry participation and direction so the CSEG, CSPG and CWLS committed to approaching key members to sit on the CFES Board of Directors. In late 2015, Graziella Kirtland Grech was approved as CFES Director, Member Society Liaison, and is presently an active participant on the CFES Board.

## Communications

2016 was a year of continued financial austerity. This entailed further painful financial decisions being made and the resulting discomfort. These decisions were made with the best of intentions to ensure the longevity of the CSEG while trying to preserve those aspects of our society that we treasure.

The RECORDER Committee as chaired by Nicole Willson ensures the regular publication of the CSEG RECORDER which is the principal medium for communication with our members and that it meets the technical and journalistic standards expected by the CSEG membership. There has been a continuation of the cost reductions started in 2015 with the elimination of the paid Chief Editor position and a reduction in the number of publications from 10 per year to 7 per year. The CSEG RECORDER has also been quite fortunate in being able to obtain not one but two volunteer Chief Editors in a very short period of time - Rob Holt who had to resign as a consequence of obtaining employment in Houston and Nicole Willson who has stepped up to replace Rob Holt. While there has always been an expectation that the RECORDER would follow in the footsteps of other publications and go fully digital eventually, due to the current financial situation this transition to fully digital has been greatly accelerated. So in 2017 the print edition of RECORDER will be discontinued. When financial conditions improve the return of the print edition will be evaluated. Thanks to the hard work of the Recorder Committee a plan has been put into place to transition to a completely paperless RECORDER in 2017. I would like thank the previous and current Chief Editors - Penny Colton, Rob Holt and Nicole Willson as well as the rest of the RECORDER committee for all their hard work in keeping the RECORDER going during this period of rapid change and difficult challenges.

The Canadian Journal of Exploration Geophysics (CJEG) with Larry Lines and Satinder Chopra as co-editors is the peer-reviewed journal of the CSEG that encompasses all aspects of research, exploration and education in applied geophysics. By good fortune and the perseverance the co-editors and associate editors it has endured through difficult economic circumstances over the years but currently receives no direct budgetary allocation. However, a shorter version of the CJEG was published through donations via the CSEG Foundation. The current Vol 41, No.1 edition of the CJEG can be found on-line at csegjournal.com in the Members only section.

While the Digital Media Committee (DMC) as chaired by Jason Schweigert has discontinued or postponed earlier initiatives due to budgetary constraints, it has been continuing to look at ways to adapt social media to better serve the CSEG membership. This includes but is not limited to looking at ways to increase visitors to the CSEG website and exploring different ways of digital revenue generation.

The CSEG does more than just promote the science of geophysics. It promotes fellowship, community and cooperation among our membership. It is my hope all these aspects of the CSEG are not forgotten and are preserved in the future. I would like to thank the Communications team for their continued support of the CSEG, all their creative solutions, hard work and patience during all the changes that have occurred during 2016.

## **Finance**

The CSEG has weathered a wide variety of economic conditions throughout its history and while we have been required to sharpen our pencils and make some difficult decisions over the past year, the Society remains in a reasonable financial position. Vulnerability still exists, however, with careful financial management we anticipate that the Society will remain an important part of the geophysical community for years to come.

Due to an economic downturn in Alberta that began in 2014, paired with GeoConvention 2016 facing direct competition from the American Association of Petroleum Geologists (AAPG) conference - hosted in Calgary in 2016, the CSEG Executive could anticipate well in advance that 2016 would face a deficit year. Despite diligent efforts to achieve a balanced budget, 2016 forecasted a \$341,275 deficit. The Executive, in cooperation with the Society's many volunteers and staff, proceeded through the year making every effort to reduce expenses and increase revenues. Every cost to the Society was analyzed carefully and some very difficult decisions were made. Significant cost saving measures were applied to the administration and RECORDER portfolios, the financial performance of non-core programs were evaluated, and efforts were invested in revenue generating programs to stimulate additional income. The result of these efforts was a year-end deficit of \$271,053, which reflects an improvement from budget by \$70,222 or 21 per cent. This should reinforce that your Executive had exercised and will continue to exercise fiscal diligence at every opportunity.

Despite improving upon our deficit budget in 2016, the reality is that 2015 was also a deficit year, as is the forecast for 2017. Recognizing that this trend is clearly unsustainable, the Executive held a strategy session in May of 2016. Armed with valuable member feedback, a variety of topics were addressed including financial health, member value, promotion of profession, and the position of the Society. Some immediate action items regarding financial health were taken including: 1) assembling a "New Initiatives Committee" designed to help generate revenue and seek new sponsorships, 2) identifying additional cost saving measures, particularly in the administration portfolio, and 3) raising membership fees, which had not been done since 2001. These and other strategic efforts continue to be measured for success and (re)evaluated at every Executive meeting through the year.

The CSEG's yearly historic financial performance is shown below in Figure 1. The deficit budget that the CSEG experienced in 2015 and 2016, and will experience in 2017 is primarily due to the impact of reduced oil prices in the energy industry. This has affected the CSEG's normal revenue stream because overall sponsorship, advertisement, and membership declined significantly. GeoConvention, which historically represents the CSEG's greatest source of revenue has also been subject to the effects of this economic downturn, contributing largely to the deficit outcomes beginning in 2015.

On a positive note, the net financial results of the 2016 operating budget resulted in an improvement over 2015, and the budget

for 2017 reflects an improvement over 2016. Throughout 2017, the CSEG Executive will remain committed to exercising diligent fiscal responsibility and ensure the forecasted improvements are realized and continue beyond 2017. This approach will support the CSEG's efforts to see the Society thrive into 2025, where we will celebrate our 75th anniversary.

# Managing Director

Going back to my report for 2015 we were well into the downturn and the affects it was having on the CSEG. Well 2016 was just as tough, perhaps worse. Several more of our members were relieved of their employment status, while more took this as an opportunity to leave the industry or completely retire. Companies and individuals who once supported the society just did not have the discretionary funds to direct our way; be it convention, continuing education (Doodletrain, Symposium, membership renewals, and sponsorship). In turn those are the very activities that we rely on for revenue to operate. I totally understand why they couldn't support us, but reality is that is what happened. Since 2014 the society has seen one million dollars in gross revenue come off the operating budget. Though we have made significant cuts within administration, programs and publications it has been virtually impossible to balance revenues with expenditures. The reserves that I was able to convince executives to begin putting away starting back early in my tenure (almost 17 years) has been our saving grace. However, even with our financial cutbacks those reserves are by no means infinite. If the current trends continue the society will eventually use up its war chest. Based on the deficits of the past two years, with the possibility of no significant additions of revenue or expenditures, 2020 could be the year of reckoning. The executive and administration are beginning to put in place plans to begin transitioning in a different direction if this situation actually occurs. Unfortunately the industry, of which the CSEG is very much a part of, is also transitioning itself to operate within the "new normal". Even though the tail end of 2016 has seen some hope, most industry pundits say it will take some time for cash to flow again and feel it will not be at the same pace. Basically when a downturn hits, a society like ours is the first place where funds are stopped being directed to and the last to return (if they do) when things begin to turn around.

Looking ahead in 2017 the Executive has no choice but to plan again for the same or even worse results, hoping the economy and the fortunes of our corporate and individual members improve to a point where they again can participate fully in our core activities. We will plan to continue offering a similar program as in the past however it will look different. The digital world that a number of entities already thrive in will be implemented even more within the society. Digital RECORDER, digital notes for Doodletrain, webinars and on and on. It may be the case where the traditional or core activities look different. Perhaps they do not happen as frequently as in the past. Certainly there is some optimism when it comes

to GeoConvention and hopefully we can see a bit of a rebound where the society can see some important funds come back to the operation.

Personally this has been an extremely trying time on a number of fronts. The CSEG is my lively hood, my workplace. I am very cognizant on the fact as an employee of the CSEG I am dealing with members to whom we work for who are currently out of work. At times it makes for an awkward and uncomfortable situation. It happens in all facets of the work world but it does not make it easier. We are all working to ensure the CSEG is here for its 75th Anniversary in 2025, but the next 2-3 years will be vital. We have some wonderful volunteers on the executive and committees who are totally committed to change and to move forward. The past is for history books. Nice to reminisce but that's about it. The future is real and something that can be navigated and directed through change. Some changes will be difficult and possibly not as successful as others. However we are at a point where there is not as much time to test the water temperature with our big toes, but instead to do the "polar bear" swim and go all in.

Finally as I complete my 17th year with the CSEG, I must recognize some key individuals for their support over the past year. Marian Hanna and John Duhault have been a huge support for me and together we are persevering through all of this change. As well our financial directors Janine Ballingall and Neda Boroumand have worked extremely hard in keeping us all in tow financially. On the Foundation side Larry Herd, Perry Kotkas and Annette Milbradt are as dedicated volunteers that you will find anywhere and the CSEG and Foundation are fortunate they work on our side. All are very committed, and along with the many volunteers serving on our committees, is the lifeblood of the CSEG. Our volunteer base is unique among technical and professional societies in today's world. As well my co-worker Alyssa Middleton has been strength of support for me and works extremely hard for both the CSEG and Foundation. She is a very committed and dedicated employee who is willing to tackle anything. As our industry and the financial environment continue to change it is our commitment to the membership to provide the best service and information possible, while always seeking new initiatives to benefit our membership.

# Chief Geophysicists Forum

The CSEG Chief Geophysicists Forum gathered on March 17, June 2, September 8 and December 1, 2016 for the quarterly morning 1.5 hour meetings at the APEGA office.

It was another successful year ending with over 60 members . The latest membership list and minutes are published on the CSEG website at http://cseg.ca/members/chief-geophysicists-forum and continues to grow with representatives (max. one per company) from various sized companies, University, consultants and retired Geophysicists.

The Forum made significant strides in promoting the value of Geophysics based on discussions, actions and publications. The CGF focus and theme for 2016 was discussion on the practical, business and scientific benefits of using geophysical analysis directed to the decision makers in our organizations and in the industry in general. Each agenda had industry updates, technical issues, operations concerns, CSEG matters and APEGA reports. The most notable accomplishments this year are as follows:

- Ideas check list: Based on discussions at each meeting, an Ideas/Points to Consider list was refined to help members approach decision makers on Geophysical budget and manpower in the various ways Geophysics can add value in their business decisions.
- 2. Value added role of Geophysics: A paper was written and published in various Technical and industry publications to educate people on the current ways Geophysics can be properly used in collaboration with other Professions to create better technical and business decisions. - Efficiency/communication on Geophysical issues: At each

The CGF next year will focus on a series of presentations outlining examples of where geophysics has been successful with discussions following as a way to continue to equip members with ways to advocate for our profession.

## **TECHNICAL**

GeoConvention 2016 hosted a total of 239 talks across 47 sessions over the three days with including 3 panel discussions and an additional 78 total posters. Under the guidance of the GeoConvention Board, the technical committee sought to diversify the 2016 content by sourcing the following groups to participate in the technical program: Society of Petroleum Engineers, Canadian Society for Gas Migration, NES Global Talent, and Citi Group.

## **EXHIBITS**

2016 struggled with Exhibit floor sales in large part due to AAPG being in Calgary in June and the poor economic conditions in the industry. Despite the 2016 cost of space holding steady at a 50% discount to similar shows, the uptake on floor space was down nearly 50% year over year. In the end, The Exhibit Hall C and D was utilized to house the 58 exhibitors. Despite the smaller floor, the exhibitors that were able to join us indicated GeoConvention 2016 was one of the best shows they had participated in with the following quotes coming from a few of our key supporters:

## **ATTENDANCE**

The 2016 GeoConvention saw further economic decline in the oil and gas sector that saw oil prices plunge from 2014 highs of \$110 per barrel down to price points in the \$40 range in 2015 and into the sub-\$30 range in the days leading up to the convention. This price decline resulted in continued industry layoffs and had a large impact on the GeoConvention attendance numbers. Overall, GeoConvention saw 2402 unique registration entries, down from 3466 in 2015. The bright side was that the Exhibit hall registrations were up year over year by 38% to 1291 leading to good exhibit floor traffic and networking opportunities for our delegates In large part, this was due to the initiative GeoConvention took in 2016 to send out personalized invitations to our participating companies to send out to their clients.

## **NETWORKING**

Networking continues to be an integral part of the convention – allowing people to reconnect and build new relationships. The networking nights again proved to be the single-biggest draw to the exhibition floor. The Monday attracted an estimated 590 visitors and the Tuesday another 475. Wednesday evening consisted of the Alumni Event and the CSEG Foundation Challenge Bowl which attracted about 100 students and industry professionals.

The final event associated with GeoConvention 2016 was the "Best of 2016 Networking Night" held at the Nexen Theater on October 27, 2016. This was the second annual "Best of" event where we had the opportunity to thank our 2016 sponsors and recognized the winners of awards for the best posters and oral presentations. Five of our award winners presented their work in 6 minute, 40 second fast-paced summary format. Is that a glimmer of positivity I see on the horizon? Perhaps we're finally on the way out of our doldrums. This year the Foundation, as did many organizations in the Earth Sciences field, experienced the effects of the continued market downswing. Last year, the Foundation board approved a deficit budget year which would have the effect of reducing our overall asset account by roughly \$96,000. Due to the diligent efforts of our committees and volunteers, we expect the actual deficit to be less than \$50,000; an amount that is more than offset by interest and capital growth gains in the CSEGF endowment investments.

With our asset base being so strong, the Foundation Board of Directors specifically elected to continue funding the programs that the Foundation supports in spite of reduced income, so that our services to the public and specifically our students were not adversely affected. The Board will continue to monitor our financial situation and make prudent budgeting and fund allocation decisions while ensuring the continuation of our core programs. This will likely mean continued deficit budgeting for 2017 and perhaps the following year until the industry recovers from the current market troubles.

## Who we are

The CSEG Foundation is a registered Canadian organization – the charitable operating arm of the Canadian Society of Exploration Geophysicists. It was initiated in 2003-04 as the brainchild of several CSEG Past Presidents and received charitable status in 2006. It is managed by an independent Board of Directors, is closely aligned with the CSEG and is ultimately controlled by the CSEG. The Mission of the CSEGF is: to encourage and support scientific, educational and charitable activities that benefit geophysicists through the solicitation of contributions aimed at promoting the development of geophysical knowledge, education and public awareness.

When the Foundation attends public events, career fairs, conferences for university students, high school science teachers and career counsellors, we strive to make the public more aware of geophysicists' contribution to the well-being of Canadian society. We convey to educators, students and the public our key role in not only the petroleum and mining industries but also in environmental engineering and the mapping of natural hazards. The scientists and support persons in the CSEG are ethical and conscientious stewards of the environment. They help to find and develop the resources essential to our daily lives.

The Foundation is a volunteer-run organization with only a small staffing overhead. Funding to support the Foundation's activities comes from generous donations from the public, members, corporate sponsors and the CSEG itself. Thanks to all who have contributed to this year's success through either your volunteer time or your financial support.

## This year's highlights

- ▶ Foundation assets grew in excess of \$2.1M thanks to the generous donations of our members and corporate supporters and the income generated from our investments.
- For the 2017 budget year, the Foundation Board elected to allocate \$18,000 of the annual operating funds to specifically support programs for unemployed members under the Special Projects Fund committee chaired by Perry Kotkas.
- ▶ The sixth Earth Science for Society (ESfS) in March hosted over 750 members of the public, 300 Girl Guides and 1,500 junior high school students from more than 11 schools. In 2016, the CSEG Foundation "adopted" ESfS and became the long-term Parent Organization for the event. Brodie Sutherland chairs the ESfS committee and is looking forward to the next event on March 19-21, 2017.
- Outreach/University Student Outreach (USO)/Public Outreach continued to support students in universities and high schools, and to inform educators and the public at large about geophysics and the CSEG while maintaining a close eye on expenses. Doug Uffen chairs Outreach, the Foundation's largest committee, accounting for about half of our operating budget outside ESfS. Outreach sent representatives with informational displays and handouts to teachers' conferences, science and physics conferences, career counsellor's conferences, and career fairs. This year, Outreach plans to initiate a stronger national online presence by utilizing videos and webinars.
- We continue to support post-secondary education and students through our Scholarship committee's efforts chaired by Craig Mosher. From 42 applications for university scholarships, the Foundation awarded 12 scholarships to students at eight universities across Canada. In addition, one scholarship was awarded to a student at a technical institute, and three scholarships were awarded to high school students entering university in the fall of 2016.

# **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

- ▶ The Foundation provided travel grants and learning subsidies (Kun Guo, Chair) to help Canadian undergraduate and post graduate students take courses and attend conferences, seminars and geoscience field trips. In 2016, \$8000 in funding was provided to assist over 25 recipients in support of travel or registration in events during the 2016 calendar year.
- ▶ Our 2016/2017 **Distinguished Lecturer** is Laurie Weston Bellman, who is giving her talk entitled "Data Interpretation and Integration from a Seismic Perspective The Excitement of Innovation" to various different universities and institutions across Canada and into Alaska, wrapping up in April, 2017.
- The Geophysical Industry Field Trip (GIFT) took over 40 students from eight different universities to various host companies, where they learned about operations, processing, interpretation and other elements of applied geophysics.
- Seismic in Motion for Students, run jointly with the CAGC, took more than 200 high school students to the Waiparous area to spend a day seeing all the aspects of seismic field operations, learn about job opportunities, and hear how we minimize environmental impact.
- Our Fund Development Committee, chaired by Doris Ross, has been working diligently to finalize the details of our new Planned Giving campaign – "Preserving the Future of Geophysics in Canada", which is set to launch in January, 2017.

In the big picture, the **CSEG Foundation's ongoing success** is attributable to several things:

- A strong Board of Directors with various levels of experience, a good set of Governance procedures, and advice and input from experienced and engaged members.
- Outstanding volunteers, some who have contributed for many years and some who are brand new, creating a dynamic mixture of experience, enthusiasm, energy and new ideas.
- Excellent financial support from our donors, including a number of very significant individual donations.

Not unexpectedly, this past year has again been a challenging one for the CSEG Foundation in terms of fund raising and sponsorship for our programs and therefore the CSEG Foundation Board was cautious and judicious when planning the budget for the 2016 fiscal year. The Board and the committees worked hard to strike a balance

between the continuance of funding long-term charitable programs and showing restraint and fiscal management while capitalizing these same programs. In late 2015, the Board approved a deficit 2016 budget of approximately \$96,000.00.

The CSEG had been a major contributor to the Foundation from inception through to 2014. With their contributions and the generous support of the CSEG members, both corporate and individual, the CSEG Foundation was able to grow its endowment each year since inception in 2007. This was accomplished while increasing the number of programs and the charitable scope of the Foundation. With initial donations from the CSEG and members, the endowment started with assets of \$457,000.00 in the commencement year. That endowment has grown through funding and interest to greater than \$1.5M. This value in not yet sufficient to sustain the current annual program expenditures without further fund development, but it is a phenomenal start over only a few years.

As with all profit and not-for-profit charitable organizations in Alberta over the 2015 and 2016 recessionary years, the CSEG and the CSEG Foundation have witnessed a sharp drop in revenues available to fund their operations. Subsequently, the CSEG has temporarily discontinued the flow of capital to the Foundation endowment. In fact, the CSEG Foundation has allowed, within their budget, for the support of the CSEG office operations that directly accommodate the day-to-day interests of the CSEG Foundation, a legitimate and reasonable request given the current climate.

I am pleased to report that even though the CSEG Foundation revenues have dropped significantly for reasons just stated, the 2016 year end projections are showing an approximate deficit of only \$50,000.00; an amount that is more than offset by interest gains in the CSEGF endowment investments. At the time of this report the Foundation is likely to have year-end assets of about \$2.092M. In 2014 and 2015, the audited reports show total equity of \$2.160M and \$2.030M, respectively.

Of particular note this year was the Canada Revenue Agency's audit of the CSEGF financial record for the period of January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2014. This was this Foundation's first audit since the outset and it went extremely well. Only two areas of non-compliance were identified and each was easy to resolve. In fact, one had already been identified and the Foundation had been waiting for feedback from the CRA for recommendations.

This year it is paramount for the financial committee to recognize the hard work of all the Foundation subcommittees to maintain the CSEGF programs which are so important to the Geoscience community while finding ways to curb spending without curtailing the integrity of the programs. The CSEG Foundation finances are managed by a team of hard working individuals and I personally want to thank Susan Thomson, Spryng Kubicek, Murray Hunter, Adrian Smith, Doug Uffen, Jim Racette, and Alyssa Middleton for

their invaluable efforts and professionalism in maintaining the CSEGF financial record. Special thanks also to Annette Milbradt, whom, although she has stepped away from the day-to-day operations of the finance committee, still disburses invaluable knowledge to the aforementioned team when needed.

In a difficult year for both corporations and individuals, new donations were understandably less than in previous years. We continued to receive support however, and on behalf of the Board of Directors and all of the students and CSEG members who benefited from Foundation programs, we thank all of you who have contributed to the Foundation.

The CSEG Foundation assets at the end of October were \$2,010,625 and the Endowment reached \$1,548,625. We received \$112,161 from previous pledges, new donations and sponsorship for programs. The CSEG has, in previous years, made significant donations to the Foundation but we knew that would not be possible in 2015. Fortunately, our strong financial position allowed us to maintain our programs, somewhat reduced and with expenses trimmed.

The Fund Development Committee met monthly and concentrated more on plans for the future than on fundraising for this year. We did solicit funds from Corporations to help finance some of our programs, but not for the endowment. We have trimmed expenses but have not made significant reductions in any of our programs, nor have we budgeted such reductions in 2016. The Directors believe that we need to maintain our programs during a downturn. We also believe that when we are ready to start soliciting donations, again we can remind potential donors that their previous donations allowed us to maintain our programs in difficult times.

We are continuing to develop a program to promote planned giving, encouraging gifts from the estates of our CSEG members. Derek Fraser, our fundraising advisor, has been very helpful with this effort. We will describe the benefits of planned giving on our website and we have set up a committee of senior CSEG members who are able to discuss it with their peers.

An effort to promote alumni support for scholarships and other university programs was launched at an alumni reception held before the CSEG-F Challenge Bowl at the May GeoConvention. The CSEG membership list does include most of our members' alma mater and we will attempt to collect more data through our annual renewals to help us organize alumni groups.

Scholarships, Outreach and Travel Grants all require fundraising and now the directors responsible for these programs are part of the Fund Development Committee.

## **Special Projects Fund**

The Special Projects Fund (SPF) was created in April of 2016 in order to "support members of the geoscience community during the current economic downturn on projects outside the annual budget of the CSEGF". Special consideration is given to under-employed and unemployed CSEG members.

## Outreach

## **DOUG UFFEN, CHAIR AND DIRECTOR**

Frugality was the theme of the year for the Outreach and USO Committees. Operating with a \$90,000 expenditure budget, the Outreach and USO team of volunteers managed to execute their collective programs at a significant cost savings. As this is being written in mid-December, budget projections anticipate that the committees will be able to execute their programs this year for a savings of approximately \$18,000. Kudos go out to the organizing committee and all the volunteers for executing this program so cost effectively. The committee's focus was to mitigate airplane travel along with hotel and meal expenditures as much as was reasonably possible, using local volunteers where we can. The Outreach and

USO committees do have offsetting revenues and much appreciation goes out to all our sponsors of our various events. In 2017, our expenditure budget has been set at \$70,000 for a net cost to the Foundation for the Outreach and USO programs of just under \$29,000. Our plans next year will focus upon more cost effective ways for delivery of our efforts in the long-term. An online web-based Outreach program is being developed so that we can reach out to schools and the public that reside outside major urban centres in Canada by using You-tube like video material. The program will showcase all aspects of geophysics and potential career paths, not just those that lead into the oil patch. For USO, we hope to have more senior level matriculated material that may make use of webinars as well as videos. This online initiative is in concert with the longstanding desire for the CSEG to expand our reach nationally across the country. This online program, once it is ready for roll-out, will help the CSEG Foundation and the society to be less Calgary-centric and oil patch-centric. It will also be less expensive to operate and maintain in the future. Personal interaction with the public and students will always be a foundation of our program but awareness can be heightened appreciably across the country with a stronger online presence.

As part of Public Outreach, chaired by Deepi Mand in the first half of the year and Sam Quiroga in the second half, the CSEG Foundation attended several career fairs across Western Canada, including Edmonton, Calgary and Vancouver, and including U of C and U of A. With our booth we were able to reach out to hundreds of students and present to them the science of geophysics using Power-Point presentations and interactive seismic displays. We received numerous requests from teachers to provide in-school presentations. In March of 2016, eleven (11) schools attended, bringing approximately 1500 students, the seventh highly successful Earth Science for Society (ESfS) exhibition. Hundreds of members of the public also attended the exhibition. On the Sunday, 300 children, from non-school groups like the Girl Guides, received guided tours of the event. It was a very well received event with lots of booth traffic and one event that is sure to be successful in 2017.

Our Schools Outreach program this year, chaired by Alessandro Carducci, included the Calgary City Teachers Convention (CCTC), the Alberta Teacher's Association (ATA Conference in Banff), and the Seismic in Motion Field School in addition to several school presentations. The Seismic in Motion field experience proves year after year to be a great event. We provided school buses for 150 students so that they could experience a unique "hands-on" education about the practical field aspects of our industry.

Our University Student Outreach (USO) program, chaired initially by Frank Ryan and most recently by Laura Osorio, includes events such as the Challenge Bowl, Mentorship for student and young professionals, and the geophysical field school, GIFT. Several student conferences are also supported by this program. This year the

Mentorship program was united with the Junior Geophysicists Forum (JGF) for an opening night event to kick-off the 2016/2017 mentorship program. By all accounts, this approach met with huge success.

Last but not least, thanks goes out to Dennis Ellison, who is our current past chairman of Outreach and USO, for his organizational skills and financial governance during his presidential term. Taking control of our financial reporting was a key step in being able ultimately to save the money we did this year. Our finances are currently being managed by the very capable Adrian Smith, who has recently moved to Newfoundland but continues to be our finance person.

The Outreach and USO committees are approaching 2017 with a new sense of optimism, with the excitement and desire to move online with our material and message.

## Earth Science for Society (ESfS)

In 2016, the CSEG Foundation agreed to become the long-term Parent Organization of Earth Science for Society (ESfS), an annual exhibition that demonstrates how the earth sciences play a critical role in our society. The exhibition is organized by a committee of over 30 volunteers who work throughout the year to ensure a successful event. From March 13th to 15th, 2016, the ESfS exhibition hosted close to 2,500 attendees. The enthusiastic visitors included 1484 students, 766 members of the public, and 300 Girl Guides. Twenty-four exhibitors provided stimulating interactive displays and our 27 generous sponsors provided \$81,000 in financial support. The exhibition relies upon the support of over 100 enthusiastic volunteers covering 200 shifts and accounting for over 700 volunteer hours. The ESfS event is a revenue neutral event for the CSEG Foundation, relying on funds that the ESfS volunteers raise themselves.

In 2017, the 7th annual ESfS exhibition will be held March 19th to 21st. Planning is well underway with 1074 students and 354 youth group participants already signed-up.

## **Scholarship**

2016 was another successful year in the 47-year history of the CSEG Foundation's scholarship program.

In 2016, the scholarship committee was able to allocate \$23,000 to 12 post-secondary students across Canada. The committee would like to acknowledge the individuals, oil and gas operating companies, service companies, the Rob Shugg Memorial Fund, the CSEG Doodlespiel and T-Wave, and the CSEG Foundation for their backing. Thank you all for your generosity, particularly in such tough times for the oil and gas industry; our program relies on your contributions and we and the recipients of funds are extremely grateful.

In 2016, we received a record number of 42 applicants for university geophysics scholarships (32 graduate, 10 undergraduate). The committee awarded 11 scholarships of \$2,000 in this category to students at eight institutions across Canada. We also awarded one scholarship of \$1,000 in the technologist category. In the summer of 2016, the committee also awarded three \$500 scholarships to high school students entering a science-based university program in the fall of the same year.

## **Travel Grants and Learning Subsidies**

The role of the Travel Grants and Learning Subsidy (TGLS) program is to provide student and professional CSEG members with financial support to develop awareness, knowledge, and skills in geoscience. In 2016, Andreas Cordsen has once again supported the TGLS program through a sponsorship commitment to the CSEG Foundation. Thank you Andreas; our committee sincerely appreciates the continued generous support.

The TGLS committee strives to provide easily accessible funding to our applicants and to build and maintain relationships with our numerous recipients. The TGLS committee is pleased to report that the development of an online application form to streamline the application process for applicants, has been successful. The TGLS committee has requested a budget of \$10,000 for the 2017 calendar year, and will be undertaking efforts to increase our exposure with under- and un-employed CSEG members, with a focus towards providing funding for skills maintenance and ongoing professional development.

The 2017 TGLS Committee would like to continue developing the relationship with university student groups and facilitating their applications for annual events (GeoConvention, GIFT, SEG Annual Meeting, geophysical field schools). Then the TGLS yearly budget can be drafted based on the number of delegates that student groups are planning to send, and the CSEGF can provide more realistic budget funding to these groups. The 2017 committee would

also like to reinforce partnerships with existing and new educational or professional development initiatives (CSEG Emerging Professionals Program, others), to overcome financial barriers and promote continuing geoscientific and geophysical education.

The CSEG Travel Grant and Learning Subsidy program continues to provide CSEG members with opportunities to learn about, develop and share geoscience in a variety of ways. We would like to extend our sincere gratitude, on behalf of our committee volunteers and all of our funding recipients, to the CSEG Executive, the CSEG Foundation, as well as the CSEGF Outreach, CSEGF USO, and CSEG Symposium committees for promoting the program and providing support. We would also like to thank our numerous applicants for continuing to make this program a success.

## Communications

The Communication Committee has the responsibility of coordinating CSEG website updates and communications between the Foundation and the general membership. The website updates keep the membership informed about activities such as scholarships, the mentorship program, GIFT, the travel grant and learning subsidy, and the CDL tour. In 2016 we added a new webpage on Planned Giving and Memorial Funds. The Planned Giving website became active in December, and gives details about the many ways a person can contribute now or leave a legacy to the Foundation. The Memorial Fund section has information about the funds and bios and photos of the five individual honorees.

## **Canadian Distinguished Lecturer**

The Foundation operates the national CSEG Canadian Distinguished Lecture Tour, which is an annual event that started in 2005. Many post-secondary Geoscience departments across Canada host an industry or academic expert who delivers a presentation highlighting topics of current interest.

The 2016/2017 Distinguished Lecturer is Laurie Weston Bellman, a well-known Calgary-based geophysicist. Laurie's career as a geophysicist in the oil and gas business has spanned almost 30 years so far. During that time, she has seen the science (and the business) from many different perspectives. She has been part of the evolution of exploration objectives and analysis techniques, both as an interested observer and an active contributor. Originally a Physics/ Astronomy graduate from the University of Victoria in B.C., Laurie has enjoyed a variety of career challenges in Canada and internationally. Laurie is presenting her talk "Data Interpretation and Integration from a Seismic Perspective – The Excitement of Innovation" to various different universities and institutions across Canada and, depending on available budget, the USA and into Alaska, wrapping up in April, 2017.

To date, she has given her presentation at 15 different venues and a further 12 are scheduled for January and February. She has now either visited or arranged a visit to every institution that had expressed interest except Alaska. Without exception, she has been welcomed warmly and treated respectfully. Her hosts have all contacted her a few days in advance to confirm her arrangements, provide maps and directions and invited her to various social events ranging from coffee to dinner, meetings with grad students and faculty, and tours of labs and facilities.



# Value of Integrated Geophysics (VIG)

## **2016 ACTIVITIES**

The VIG committee was created in the spring of 2013 and we have continued to fulfill our mandate of promoting the value of geophysics and its countless applications to the CSEG, CSPG, APEGA, SPE and the finance community. We continue to be involved in a number of activities consisting of presentations, courses, inter-society outreach and other CSEG activities. In all, we gave, or coordinated, close to a dozen presentations and one course.

The 2016 season started with the February CSEG Luncheon VIG talk presented by Lee Hunt titled, "Value Thinking from the Classical to the Hyper-Modern".

With the mission of developing strong, inter-society connections of geoscientists and engineers to improve economic success in the oil industry, members of the VIG Committee presented at the SPE Technical Breakfast series in April 2016 at the Calgary Petroleum Club. The 3-part series was presented by Lee Hunt, David Gray and John Duhault. Titles of each talk were "A Critical Point", "Demystifying Geophysics" and "Applied Geophysics for Engineers Using Case Histories", respectively. A more complete description was captured as an article in the September 2016 Recorder.

The VIG Committee has an ongoing commitment to assist the 2016 Symposium Chair (Laurie Ross) by providing speakers to present. This year we continued with our theme of inter-society connections with Adam Yousefzadeh for Dr. Roberto Aguilera, a Distinguished Lecturer from the SPE who provided a paper titled, "Use of Petroleum Engineering Concepts for Estimation of Pore Stimulated Reservoir Volume and Prediction of Well Performance". We remained firm on value oriented talks with Lee Hunt who gave a presentation titled, "Addressing the Business Problem Involving Interfering Thin Sands with Timeslices and the Correlation Helix".

Continuing with more inter-society opportunities was the May CSEG Luncheon talk presented by Claudio Virues from the SPE titled, "The New in Microseismic Based Prediction of Ultimate Stage by Stage SRV through Engineering".

Also in May, coordinated by Ruth Peach, members of the committee met with Tom Sneddon, Director of Geoscience at APEGA, to brainstorm ideas about presentation and publication opportunities, web promotion, VIG champions, decision makers, and the possibility of presenting at annual APEGA Summits.

At GeoConvention in May, David Gray gave a talk titled "Fractured Fairy Tales", which dealt with how geoscientists should use their expertise to inform the public about things they care about, such as global warming/climate change and hydraulic fracturing.

The June 2016 VIG focus was provided by Paul Hausmanis who presented Lee Hunt's talk titled "The Value of Integrated Geophysics" to university students during the CSEG Foundation's Geophysical Industry Field Trip (GIFT).

In September 2016 John Duhault presented at the APEGA Luncheon with a VIG talk titled, "Geophysics: Maximizing Corporate Profits During Low Commodity Prices". The topic focused on how geophysics can be properly accounted for in planning capital expenditures to maximize asset value in today's low commodity prices.

In October 2016 John Duhault announced that as of January, he would step down as Chair of the VIG, because of his future responsibilities as President of the CSEG in 2017. That same month John attended the SEG Convention with Marian Hanna as the CSEG Executive Representatives and to promote VIG.

In November 2016, John Duhault presented the updated one-day VIG course during the CSEG's Doodletrain. The first half of the day included critical thinking and decision analysis processes followed in the afternoon by "valued added" case histories including a microseismic component presented by Matt Ng. Although the course was well received, the numbers were quite low due to the poor climate of the industry. John also presented at the CWLS Technical Luncheon a variation of the same talk that he did for APEGA.

## Outlook for 2017

The committee plans to continue promoting opportunities that demonstrate the value of geophysics. To that end, we have some scheduled and future planned activities for 2017.

# DoodleTrain 2016

In this difficult year for the industry the DoodleTrain week succeeded in attracting 181 registrants to 12 high quality courses. Eight courses were repeated from last year, one course was brought back from previous years and there were three new courses. Of the three new courses two were by local instructors, Laurie Weston Bellman and Marco Perez and one from an international instructor, Alan Atkinson, each of these was very well received. Courses were run in 4 different categories; Acquisition & Processing (2), Reservoir Geophysics (5), Interdisciplinary (4) and Topics for Technologists (1). The prime mandate for the DoodleTrain week is provide world class training to the membership if the CSEG and this was again achieved this year. Given the prevailing economic conditions incentives were offered to encourage enrollment. One free course was offered for every four equivalent registrations, for six registrations in the same course 2 free equivalent registrations were offered and for every \$1,000 spent on DoodleTrain sponsorship 1 free course was offered. The CSEG Foundation was approached and offered to help fund the attendance of un/underemployed geophysicists and also to subsidize the expenses for the winner of the Bill Nickerson Education Award. The DoodleTrain Committee wanted to offer some assistance to those geophysicists no longer in full time employment due to the downturn. In this vein, and with the assistance from the CSEG Foundation, reduced rates were offered to underemployed CSEG members at a rate of \$100 per course day, which included a ticket for the Technical Luncheon.

The CSEG Foundation assistance for the Bill Nickerson Education award was also very important as this is now open to higher education establishments offering geophysics courses across Canada and the winner was a PhD student, Masoud Aali, from Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia. During the year presentations were again made to the Chief Geophysicists Forum to keep them informed on progress and to share with them the nature of the courses being offered.

# 2016 CSEG Symposium

The fifth annual CSEG Symposium was held on April 28th, 2016. The Symposium was initiated to honour Canadian geophysicists who have distinguished themselves through their outstanding contributions to our industry. In 2016 the CSEG Symposium posthumously honoured Bill Nickerson, a highly-respected, motivated CSEG member who volunteered determinedly so that the CSEG could offer its members quality continuing education programs. Bill had a vision to organize quality training for Canadian geophysicists and he was the guiding force behind the successful creation of the CSEG DoodleTrain. The theme for the 2016 CSEG Symposium was Integrity, Knowledge and Wisdom; three words which exemplified the gifted person Bill was. The Symposium celebrated Bill's career and his contribution to the CSEG with a day of education; taking an honest look at modern geophysics through case studies.

# Canadian Journal of Exploration Geophysics



The Canadian Journal of Exploration Geophysics (CJEG), the flagship peer-reviewed journal of the CSEG, was revived in 2010 following an eleven year hiatus. Electronic issues of CJEG were published every year since this revival - in June 2011, June 2012, June 2013, June 2014 and June 2015 (printed in August 2015), and June 2016. The editorial staff of CJEG in 2015 included Larry Lines and Satinder Chopra as Co-

Editors. The CJEG Associate Editors are Sven Treitel, Patrick Daley and Kris Innanen.

As of February 2016, the revived journal has received 42 submitted papers. The statistics for these 41 submittals are as follows:

- 33 papers have been published (6 in June 2011, 6 in June 2012, 7 in June 2013, 6 in June 2014 issues, 6 in June 2015, 2 in June, 2016).
- 2. 1 paper has been accepted for the June 2017 issue.
- 3. 4 papers have been reviewed and are under revision.
- 4. 2 papers has been rejected as being inappropriate for CJEG
- 5. 1 paper was withdrawn.

The 2016 year was a very challenging one for the CSEG and consequently the CJEG. For the 2016 year, the CJEG budget was set to zero due to the current CSEG budget issues. The funding for publishing a shortened journal publication with only 2 papers was made possible by donations to the SEG Foundation by Brian Russell, Marko Mah and

Larry Lines. The decision was made to publish an abbreviated issue of CJEG rather than have the journal go into dormancy.

All the journal papers are peer-reviewed in a timely fashion, with a desired turnaround time of less than 3 months. Papers are generally reviewed by 2-3 reviewers who have technical expertise.

The PRINTMAN, Calgary provided composing/printing services for the CJEG, and has been found to be excellent in terms of quality and efficiency.

The criteria for submitted papers is outlined on the CSEG web site and are as follows:

- 1. The paper should be technically correct.
- 2. The paper should discuss a relevant technical topic in applied geophysics which is of interest to members of CSEG.
- 3. Papers should have correct English grammar and spelling.
- 4. Papers should be clearly written for a general exploration geophysics readership.
- 5. The text of papers should be in Word format. Illustrations should have high quality resolution in .tif or .jpeg format.

Papers may be submitted to the Co-Editors, Larry Lines at Irlines@ ucalgary.ca or Satinder Chopra at schopra@arcis.com . While the journal has published six papers per year, we are constantly receiving papers from noted international geophysicists. Our goal is to publish 1-2 issues of the journal every year. To achieve this objective, we are encouraging papers from exploration geophysicists not only in Canada, but around the world. At present, copies of CJEG are available on the web site to all CSEG members.



# CGG GEOSOFTWARE WORKSHOP – AN INTRODUCTION TO SEISMIC INVERSION

In 2015, the CSEG EPP paired with CGG GeoSoftware to host an interactive workshop on Seismic Well Ties. Taught by Graham Carter, this event was very successful. This year we continued to work with CGG GeoSoftware and Graham Carter to host an interactive session on Seismic Inversions. The inversion of seismic data is a practical process that results in the recreation of the geology. This process continues to be an important aspect in reservoir characterization.

The workshop this year took place on September 15th, 2016 from 9:00am to 12:00pm at the CGG Office. The half-day session guided young professionals, step by step, through the basic workflow for post-stack seismic inversions that included practice exercises. The importance of 'the model' and how the inversion results are quality controlled using well logs was also highlighted. The session was well designed for those with no practical experience of running inversions, but planned to be involved in reservoir geophysics in the future. Once again the session was filled to capacity and the CSEG EPP hopes to continue to work with CGG GeoSoftware in the upcoming year.

## **VOLUNTEERING AT THE CALGARY DROP INN CENTER**

The EPP initiated a bi-monthly volunteering event at the Calgary Drop in Center with assistance from the University of Calgary EAGE Student Chapter. ## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Canadian Society of Exploration Geophysicists

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Canadian Society of Exploration Geophysicists, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2016 and the statements of revenues and expenditures and changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

## Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified audit opinion.

## Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, the Society derives revenue from member contributions and activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Society and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to contributions, excess of revenues over expenses, current assets and net assets.

## **Qualified Opinion**

In my opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which I might have determined to be necessary had I been able to satisfy myself concerning the completeness of the contributions referred to in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Canadian Society of Exploration Geophysicists as at December 31, 2016 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

# Notes to Financial Statements Year Ended December 31, 2016

## BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (GAAP).

## NATURE AND OBJECT OF THE SOCIETY

The Canadian Society of Exploration Geophysicists (the Society) was established as a Society under the Societies Act of Alberta on December 20, 1949 as a not-for-profit organization.

The object of the Society is to promote the science of geophysics, especially as it applies to exploration, and to promote fellowship and cooperation among the persons interested in geophysical problems.

## SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Revenue recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Project revenues and expenses are recognized in the Project Fund during the period when the revenue is received and expenses are incurred.

Convention revenues and expenses are recognized in the Convention Fund during the period when the convention is held.

## Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded in the Operating Fund at cost. Amortization is provided on straight-line basis over three to eight years, being the estimated useful life of the assets.

Leasehold improvements are amortized on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease, which is five years.

## Contributed services

The operations of Society are dependant on the services of many volunteers. Although these volunteered services form an integral part of the ongoing operations, the value of contributed services has not been recognized in these financial statements.

## Social committees

Various social committees within the society have monies available to them in order to administer the specific activities for which the committees were established.

The financial activities of these committees have not been reported upon in these financial statements..

## Income taxes

The Society is a not-for-profit organization and is exempt from income taxes pursuant to Section 149 of the Income Tax Act.

## Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

## 4. INTERNALLY RESTRICTED FUND BALANCES AND INTERFUND TRANSFERS

The Society's Executive Committee has internally restricted funds amounting to \$1,071,632 (2015-\$1,431,632). These amounts are not available for other purposes without approval of the Executive Committee. During the year the Boad of Directors passed a resolution to transfer \$360,000 from this restricted fund to its operation fund. The internally restricted fund provides for sustanable administration, recorder and membership costs.

## 6. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Society's financial instruments that are included in the statement of financial position are comprised of cash , accounts receivable., accounts payable and deferred revenue, all of which approximate fair value due to the immediate or short term maturity of these instruments. In addition, included in restricted assets are \$ 800,600 of guarenteed investment certificates with maturities ranging from July 2017 to July 2020 bearing interest at rates between 1.2% to 2.1% . The Society has some exposure to changes in interest rates on these investments over this period. It is the opinion of management that the Society is not exposed to any material credit ,or liquidity risk on any of the other financial instruments.

## 7. COMMITMENTS
