His distinguished career as a geophysicist and ending as exploration manager has included working at the following companies; Amoco Canada 1956-66, Canadian Occidental 1966-72, Ashland Oil and (subsequently Kaiser Oil Ltd.) 1973-80, Sceptre Resources 1980-1984. International and Domestic Geophysical Consultant 1985-1995.

Ken's was always involved in the community. In his early years he was very active with cub scouts as a troop leader. Ken enjoyed many sports. In his latter years you would often find Ken swinging a golf club with his buddies or trying to catch an elusive rainbow trout. His knowledge of current events and sports statistics exemplified his very sharp mind.
