Frequently Asked Questions for Mentees

1. What is my key role as a mentee?

a. Your key role is to learn. Your goal should be to put your best foot forward, and an open hard working attitude will get you a long way. It is the mentees responsibility to make first contact with the mentor.

2. Is it my mentor's responsibility to get me a job? Is it appropriate to ask my mentor for a job?

a. Is not your mentor's responsibility to get you a job. It is not appropriate to ask your mentor for a job at any given point in time. However, it is encouraged to ask your mentor to look at your resume, provide feedback, and offer insight into how different companies hire. Don't be afraid to ask questions on any level, but to optimize your mentors time, coming with questions prepared is ideal.

3. What are some activities that my mentor and I can do together?

4. What year of school do I need to be in to sign up as a mentee?
